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Jesus speaks

few years ago, I welcomed a new seven-year-old pupil to the school. At the end of her first term, she gave me a picture she had drawn of the school building, to which she had added some lovely words. "This school is so welcoming", she had written. "Thank you for letting me come to this school - it's the best." These were beautiful words and it meant a lot to me to receive them. It was other words, however, that the pupil had written that struck me most profoundly and memorably. "You are Jesus", she had written.

The girl was articulate. She was able to choose words advisedly. She knew perfectly well that I am not Jesus, and yet she had written, "You are Jesus".

Jesus himself asked, "Who do people say I am?" Different people gave different answers before Peter demonstrated his belief and understanding of the identity of Jesus.

"Who do people say I am?" is a question we might ask ourselves. I am Mr George, as any pupil in the school could have said. Yet'l am humbled by the realisation that in saying "You are Jesus", the pupil who wrote to me was declaring that she recognised that I tried to be a face of Jesus in the school, to live like Jesus, to love like Jesus.

I've received no greater recognition than this, nor bigger challenge. "Who do people say I am?" To whom will I be the face of Jesus today?

Ss Andrew Kim Taegon, Paul Chong Hasang and Companions

The faithfulness and courage of Korean Christians has been - and still is - extraordinary. Between 1791 and 1866, approximately 10,000 are known to have died for their faith, most of them laypeople. Every priest who could be found was also executed. The Church survived, however, because of the laity who risked their lives for the Gospel. In fact, when a Chinese priest secretly entered Korea in the early nineteenth century, he found 4000 Catholics, none of whom had ever seen a priest. An unknown number, then and since, were unrecorded as they died for their faith.

Just before his execution in 1846, St Andrew Kim Taegon, aged 25 and the first Korean-born Catholic priest, spoke his last words: "This is my last hour of life, listen to me attentively: if I have held communication with foreigners, it has been for my religion and my God. It is for him that I die. My immortal life is on the point of beginning."
