Jubilee 2025: Pilgrims of Hope Jubilee 1600

Pilgrims who climb the Scala Sancta in Rome, learn that crawling up the first two or three of the twenty-eight white marble steps is not particularly uncomfortable. The last few require huge willpower and determination! Yet every year, thousands of pilgrims tackle the staircase which, tradition says, Jesus climbed towards Pilate. St Helena apparently brought the Scala Sancta to Rome from the Praetorium in Jerusalem in AD 326.

During the Jubilee Year of 1600, Pope Clement VIII (the first Pope to drink coffee!) climbed the steps on his knees, served meals to pilgrims, and ate with twelve of the city's poor each day. Rome's Jewish community supplied five hundred blankets so that pilgrims could sleep more comfortably. As a sign of penitence, cardinals renounced their red regalia for the year. Despite the huge difficulties and dangers involved in making a pilgrimage, more than one million people travelled to Rome for the Jubilee.
